Breast Cancer Survivor says 3D Mammography will Help Future Patients

Friends Foundation Campaign Goal \$1.1 Million

iverview resident Katherine Reeder has had yearly mammograms since she was 44, because of breast tenderness. Results had always been clear until this past June, when within a few days of having had the mammogram she received a phone call telling her that she needed to have additional mammograms done, followed by a core biopsy using mammographic guidance (a hollow needle used to remove some tissue) on June 30th.

On July 8th, Katherine was diagnosed with ductal carcinoma in situ (DCIS) and on August 18th underwent a double mastectomy.

If it wasn't for routine mammograms this could have ended up very differently for Katherine, as DCIS is not usually associated with a mass, so the mammogram was the way it was detected. If she opted out of her regular mammograms, the probability of her developing breast cancer in one or both breasts would have been very high given her prior chest wall radiation.



Katherine, an LPN at The Moncton Hospital for over 44 years was already back to the work she loves in September. She was delighted to hear that the Friends of The Moncton Hospital Foundation will raise \$1.1 Million for two 3D Mammography Screening Units for the Katherine Wright Centre (KWC) to help with the early detection of breast cancer. This upgrade will allow for the transition from a conventional Digital Mammogram (2D

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image) to Digital Breast Tomosynthesis (3D image) technology resulting in optimal patient care, improved patient experience and better outcomes. The current two screening units located in the KWC were purchased by the Friends in 2008. These units are aging and need to be replaced with the latest technology.

For women in New Brunswick, breast cancer is the most frequently diagnosed type of cancer. Survival rates increase when breast cancer is detected early through regular breast screening with access to "best in class" technology.

This advanced form of mammography can detect a cancer much earlier and easier

especially within an area of dense breast tissue. The benefits of finding a cancer at an early stage can mean that the patient will have less invasive surgery and treatments.

This 3D technology, which is used to look for breast cancer in women who have no signs or symptoms, will improve the patient experience by offering shorter and more comfortable screening mammography procedures.

Campaign Co-Chairs Dr. Heather Tait and Ryan Dillon, encourage donors to give to advance breast cancer screening at The Moncton Hospital.

"In our community, virtually everyone knows someone who has received the results of their mammogram and heard the unsettling news that they are now battling breast cancer. The good news is that breast screening and early detection will save lives," remark Dr. Tait and Dillon.
