Woman Who Almost Died from Covid-19 Praises Compassionate Care at The Moncton Hospital

Debby Clements is grateful to be alive.

he 47-year-old, who has a history of asthma, said she tested positive for the Covid-19 virus and was rushed to the Intensive Care Unit (ICU) at The Moncton Hospital in early April, struggling to breathe. Debby Clements spent four weeks – three of those in the ICU – on a ventilator while being treated for the virus. Her husband, Mark Clements, who also tested positive but had only mild

symptoms, was not allowed to visit his wife in the hospital. The experience was extremely difficult for the entire family.

"I don't remember a lot of my experience at The Moncton Hospital, but I am especially grateful for the very brave and kind doctors, nurses and other helpers. I know it was not only a scary time for me, but also for the caring professionals around me. I told them I could never do their job, and

I meant it. They are some pretty big heroes. I especially remember one time while going in and out of consciousness in the ICU, a nurse was trying to calm me down as I was hallucinating, couldn't speak and was terrified. She said a prayer with me. I don't know who it was, but she was so vital in that moment. Also, I will never forget the nurse who held my hand all

night while watching HGTV reruns.

At that point, I didn't know what was real and what wasn't, but just her being there holding my hand told me I was safe and not alone. This was especially important because my family wasn't allowed to visit the hospital and I didn't understand what was happening. Another sliver of time I remember was while I was waking up and two nurses were bathing me and washing my hair. They were so gentle and sweet. I felt safe and loved. And I am blessed that when I came home Dr. Daniel Smyth, Infectious Disease Physician, was kind enough to check on me because he knew going to the hospital was much too difficult. He has been so helpful in explaining what happened and answering my questions and that has helped me move forward and heal, body and soul," says Debby.

Debby still suffers from extreme fatigue and breathing difficulties and the emotional scars caused by the traumatic experience are difficult to talk about. "Life since my illness has been challenging some days, I have lost over half my hair, my voice and throat are still problematic, and I still get tired very easily. I wrestle with the anxiety of the whole ordeal, but I just try to remember how far I've come since that time in April and press on. My family is my life and I am grateful that I am here for every extra day that I get to be with them."



COVID-19 CARE FUND for TMH

"I want to give back"

Cancer patient battling Stage 4 metastatic breast cancer cycles to raise funds for hospital

ini Bourque of Moncton, battling breast cancer for a second time, was one of the participants in the physician-led NB Doctors Cycling Against Cancer Ride (NBDocsCAC) raising funds for the Dr. Sheldon H. Rubin Oncology Clinic and the inpatient unit at The Moncton Hospital. And raise funds she did. Due to remarkable support from family and friends, her initial goal of \$2,000 was blown out of the park, raising over \$25,000!

There were many days the 47-year-old struggled to muster the energy to cycle, in what changed to a solo ride due to Covid-19, but she persevered, knowing where those funds were going. You see Gini is a fighter. She was first diagnosed with breast cancer in 2015. In 2017, she returned to work and was on the path of getting her life back with an "I'm a survivor" mindset. It was not long before "it" was back. She received the devasting news in November 2019 that this time the cancer had metastasized to her bones. Even that blow didn't stop Gini. For her own mental wellbeing, she joined the other solo cyclists in this year's ride. Afterall, she first rode in the event in 2017 and she wanted to do it again to give back for

all the great care she continues to receive while she battles this terminal illness.

"I feel lucky and loved. I have a team of admins, schedulers, psychologists, technicians, nurses, doctors, surgeons, phlebotomist and Friends Foundation staff who have all been kind, empathetic and patient with me during this cancer journey. I'm at the clinic approximately 7 to 10 times a month and am thankful to visit a safe beautiful clinic full of lovely people who are now part of my life. I want people to see how a patient like me can actually help others."

Bourque believes you should keep moving when you have cancer and says being active helps her keep going and she feels good about helping support other patients like her. The 2020 ride raised over \$100,000 - the most in its 6-year history. These funds will go towards the acquisition of a \$234,000 digital slide scanner to help pathologists detect cancer. This system will result in quicker turnaround of test results, allowing patients to receive their diagnosis and treatment more quickly. The entire purchase is being covered by the NB Doctors Cycling Against Cancer

The new advanced ultrasound has arrived at TMH [First in New Brunswick]

hanks to hundreds of caring donors, a new ultrasound and probes that displays outstanding 3-D images of the kidneys on a high-resolution monitor during laparoscopic or minimally invasive surgery has made its new home in the Operating Room.

Dr. Troy Sitland, Urologist, says this technology allows him to safely and very quickly identify the exact location of the tumour in the kidney.

Although not suitable for all patients, the new ultrasound equipment is expected to be used in at least one third of the kidney cancer cases.
